The panel, headed by Circuit Judge Clement F. Haynsworth of Greenville, handed down the order after listening to less than an hour to argument, and motions in

the case. The court sa eapportionment of the Senate must be accomplished 30 days before any party conventions or primaries in 1966 but no later than April 1.

Party conventions are now scheduled in March. The ruling would allow the parties to postpone conventions until May, giving the legislature more time.
