The Dunn High School Greenwaves picked up their first win in the basketball season last night when they defeated Benson 52-36 in the girls game and 54-49 in the boys.

Past Catches Up With Escapee

JACKSONVILLE (UPD) — The past caught up with Russell Smith Wednesday after more than 38 years.

Smith, 64, was charged with burning his new home to collect insurance money and the investigation of the alleged arson led officers to identify the brick mason as an escapee from an Ohio honor camp Oct. 29, 1927.

Charged along with Smith on the arson warrant was his 69-year-old wife, Lena. They are accused of starting the fire that destroyed their Rt. 2, Jacksonville home Nov. 27. The house was insured for \$23,000.

On Oct. 9, the first year of his sentence, he was transferred to the Lebanon honor camp at London, Ohio. The 28th of that month he disappeared.

Diane Clifton, Brooke Dunn, Sharon Smith, Kay Lee and Donaj Warren were other players for Benson.

Coach Glenn Varney commenting on the game said that his girls played like "tigers" and he was exceedingly proud of them.

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Coach Bobby Tart's boys played a good game picking up 21 points in the first quarter while Benson

only made 5.
However, in the second quarter the opponents made 22 points to the Waves 4 and thus tied the game at half time.

In the third quarter the Waves led by only one point scoring 10 to Benson's 9.

In the final quarter, which won the game for the Waves, they scored 19 points to Benson's 13.

Dunn's captain, Perry Lewis, picked up 23 points for his team. Running second was Allan Pope, who threw 12 points into the basket.

Mike Godwin and Mickey Hodges both scored four points for their team while John Thornton picked up 7 and Robie Butler was a 3 pointer.

Benson's Chuck Parker scored 12 points for his team. Running second were Lee and Dixon, who both put 3 points into the basket.

Other scorers were Wayne Gibbs, 6; Stancil, 6; and Bostic, 6.

Coach Tart said his team played well but did not do as well as they will after more practice.

He said he hoped for a greater victory over Pine Forest in the first home game of the season Tuesday night and added that he hoped a large crowd of local supporters would be on hand for the game.

Crime Rate Up 5 Percent

WASHINGTON (UPD) — The national crime rate jumped 5 per cent in the first nine months of this year, FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover reported today.

Violent crime increased in all four major categories - murder, rape, robbery and aggravated assault. The number of rape cases increased 6 per cent, murder and robbery were up 5 per cent each and assault rose 7 per cent.

The figures compared the first three quarters of 1955 with the corresponding period of last year. Following a recent trend, crime rates rose slower in big cities than in small towns and suburbs. The FBI recorded a 2 per cent hike in cities with population of more than one million and a 7 per cent increase in towns of 20,000 to 50,000 persons.

The suburbs showed the sharpest increase in serious crime. Robberies rose 18 per cent, rape 11 per cent and grand theft involving over \$50, was up 10 per cent in suburbia.

The FBI said it found no general jump in farm area crime rates, but reported a 10 per cent increase in murders. The robbery rate declined 10 per cent and auto thefts, dropped 8 per cent.

LEASE, SALE AND TRANSFER OF COTTON ALLOTMENTS
The transferring of cotton allotments by lease or sale, in or out of Harnett County, will be in effect during 1966, 1967, and 1968. The out transfers will be restricted within the State. Applications must be filed at the transferring ASCS Office by December 31, 1965. A register of 1965 released and reapportioned acreage will be available to interested producers. Lists of producers who wish to sell, buy, or lease will also be maintained and a cross county list of sale or lease offers will be made and received weekly. These lists will also be available. Full details are available at the ASCS Office.

MARKETING CARDS RETURNED
Tobacco producers that have not returned their 1965 marketing card have been mailed a postal card requesting that these cards be returned to the county office. Committeemen should urge all farmers in their community to return these marketing cards, as it is very important that we complete the 1965 production records.

Individual farm quotas on tobacco cannot be determined until the 1965 sales are verified in the county office, as under or over selling will affect the farm quota for 1966.

TOBACCO LEASE AND TRANSFER
Lease and transfer provisions for flue-cured tobacco have been extended for four years, beginning with the 1966 crop. Lease and transfer will now be on a pound for pound basis. The person leasing tobacco will be limited to the number of pounds obtained by multiplying 5 acres times his current year's farm yield. All lease agreements will be on a year to year basis, and leases for the 1966 crop year must be filed in the county office not later than April 1, 1966.
