

MeNamara told a news conference the 126 domestic bases involin 39 states and Washiniton, would be identified on Wed-

23 overseas bases, at which nillion of the total savings will identified after consultation the foreign governments in-

Namara said that, more than 53,000 military and civilian jobs would be eliminated and an adnal 29,000 militany and civilian personnel would be relocated as a result of the closinigs.

All civilians affected will be offesed other government jobs. Transfered nother government jobs, transportation and retraining expenses will be paid where necessary. McNamara said the closings wh-

ich affect bases employing more than 250 persons - distinguished from reductions would be "subject to congressional review."

Under this year's military conuction act. Congress must be ified 30 days prior to the close of a base with more than 250 persons. Full reports called for by the law will go to Congress Jan. 10, McNamara said. There will be no closures until 30 days later.
