HELPFUL SAFETY HINTS

It is moré blessed to give than to receive. . .especially when you are entering a freeway.

In this case, giving means yielding right of way to the cars already on the freeway. If you try to force your car into the traffic flow, you could force a

driver to hit his brakes and he could receive a severe jolt in the rear from the car Getting on a freeway safe-

ly is your problem, not the problem of drivers already there. If they vary their speed to accommodate you, they could cause a major pileup.

Entrance ramps usually lead to an acceleration lane, and it may be a long one or a short one, or it may branch off into an exit. If traffic is heavy, you must find a gap between cars and time your approach to bring you to that gap as close as possible to the prevailing speed of the other cars.

Turn on your turn signal, check your rear-view mirrors, and take several quick glances over your shoulder. If you are alert, you will usually be able to blend into the traffic flow. If you are following another car, keep in mind that it may slow down or stop suddenly if the driver is having trouble getting into

When you are on a through lane and see another driver about to enter that lane from a rimp, remember - making roon for him is for your own safety's sake
