Nets Record

\$11 Million

New York -- An all-time high record of \$11.9-million was raised in the 1974 Annual Campaign conducted by the United Negro College Fund. It surpassed the 1973 total of \$10.5million by almost a million and a half dollars.

Thomas A. Murphy, UNCF National Campaign Chairman called the total "a truly remarkable accomplishment in the light of today's economy."

Mr. Murphy said that intensive staff training carried out in management workshops throughout the year paid off in the kind of aggressive, efficient leadership needed to carry the drive to the record

total. solicitation, under the direction of A. Dean Swift, especially should be commended for its work," Mr. Murphy said. American businesses contributed \$4.4-million to the UNCF drive in 1974, also a record amount. Some corporations were

among those contributing. .Mr. Murphy, the board chairman of General Motors Corp., said he was also "Extremely pleased" at the showing of the foundations fundraising effort which increased in total \$63,630 over last year at a time when foundaitons were cutting back on their grants. Foundations contributed \$1.9-million to the 1974

total. . Mr. Murphy said it was "very significant" to note the largest gift ever received from an organization came from a black organization, The Links, Inc., a national women's group. The Links presented the Fund with a check for \$132,00 at a luncheon in Washington, D. C. last summer.

Other areas which showed substantial gains in the drive included: colleges and universities, \$879,637, up from 548,646; organized groups, \$672,925, up from \$372,106; municipal employees, \$66,505. up from \$38,027; and Post Office Employees, \$31,323, up from \$21,780. Union contributions increased almost 75 percent, from \$20,997 to \$34,071.

Largest corporate donors to the UNCF were: General Motors. \$300,000; IBM System, \$152,800; Bell \$87,775; Roebuck Foundation, \$85,000; Johnson (through the Ebony Fashion Fare) \$78,264; Olin Corp. Ford Motor Co. Fund, \$60,000 and U. S. Steel Foundation,
