## Sen. Scott Suggests Closing

Greensboro, - A legislator from Alamance County, North Carolina last week suggested that A&T State University should be merged with the Unviersity of North Carolina at Greensboro and North-Carolina State University in Raleigh.

Sen. Ralph Scott, co-chairman of the General Assembly joint Appropriations Committee, said A&T's engineering and agriculture departments should be shifted to Raleigh and the other departments to UNC-G.

In all likelihood, he said, this would mean the big A&T cam-

pus would have to be closed, although he said some future

action to the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW) making a recent ruling that that action by the Board of Governors of the University of North Carolina in placing a new school of veterinary medicine at N. C. State University in Raleigh, instead of A&T, may violate civil rights laws.

Also answering Scott was Atty. Walter Johnson Jr., the president of the Greensboro School Board and a graduate

He said it indicates racism and mixed-up priorities. Johnson wondered why the state would even consider spending \$20 million to get the veteri-

nary medicine school at Raleigh when it would cost only \$15 million to put it at A&T, unless the proposal was racially motivated.

He also wondered why the state should spend \$50 million for another medical school. placed at East Carolina

University, when not enough is being done to help public schools improve the reading abilities of the average


