The hours of child care will be 6 p.m. to 10 p.m., Monday through Thursday. Enrollment is on a quarterly basis, and the CPCC student must present his or her registration card at the time of enrollment of the child. Enrollment must be in advance of class attendance to reserve a space for the child.

The cost per child per evening is \$2.60, and all fees are payable four weeks in advance in the CPCC business office. This service is being offered within CPCC's present licensing framework. It is possible that purchase of care sponsorship for marginal income parents can be arranged through Social Services.

Financial commitments make it necessary for the College to have at least thirty children rolled each quarter in order to offer this service. Each child will be required to have a health certificate.
