The new volunteer receives a personal interview, completes basic orientation and then receives specialized training for the particular job they choose. Volunteer opportunities during the day include typists, registrars, donor rooms and canteen aides for the blood program. Others may choose to drive the handicapped, work in hospitals or nursing homes, teach classes or serve on emergency aid teams. Evening and weekend hours are available for hospital and first aid volunteers. Weekend hours are available for work at the Blood Center, fifth largest in the nation.


