

Rev. Lewter Will Lead Mt Moriah's Revival

Rev. A. L. Lewter, who is called "a dynamic preacher and an inspirational singer, will lead the annual revival services at Greater Mount Moriah Primitive Baptist Church, beginning Sunday, May 16.

According to Rev. Thomas W. Samuels, pastor at the 1747 W. Trade Street church, Rev. Lewter is a great evangelist. "We're very pleased to have secured the services of this great gentleman."

The pastor of St. John Primitive Baptist Church in Clearwater, Fla. will be assisted each night by Primitive Baptist Churches in the Charlotte area. Catawba Presbytery
Four persons from the Charlotte area will be among the approximately 700 commissioners to the 188th United Presbyterian General Assembly, which meets May 18-26 in Baltimore, Md. Announcement of the commissioners' election was made by Daniel O. Hennigan, stated clerk of the Presbytery of Catawba.

Also attending are Dr. Elo Henderson, Unit Executive, Mrs. Doris S. Henderson, and Rev. D.G. Burke. Chosen as youth advisory delegates (with voice but not vote) was Shelton Grier.

As voting delegates to the highest policy-making body of the 2.7 million-member denomination, the commissioners will participate in two key elections, and help decide a number of issues affecting the church. The election of a moderator (presiding officer and highest elective official of the church) for a one-year term will be among the first actions of the Assembly. Also on the docket is the election of a stated clerk (chief executive officer) of the General Assembly, for a five-year term.

Among issues due to face the Assembly are the financing of the minority education institutions related to the denomination, the ordination of

homosexuals to the ministry, the future of the church's historic overseas and U.S. mission in the face of budget problems, and a proposal to establish salary minimums for all pastors.
