from the remainder of the grant award through the continuation of its Entry Level Program (freshman studies), the Institutional Research Program, the International Curriculum Program, and the Long-Range Planning Pro-

The new program for the 1976-77 school year will include support for Administrative Improvement with Davidson College serving as the assisting institution; support for a Learning Resources Center and for the development of a Test Taking and Learning Skill Program. 18,000 Elderly Poor Provided Jobs

WASHINGTON--More than 18,000 workers, 55 and over, were provided federally subsidized, part-time community service jobs in the nine months ending March 31, Secretary of Labor W.J. Usery Jr.has announced.

Black workers accounted for 20 percent of the 13,210 participants who were in the program as of March 31.

The older workers, all economically disadvantaged were participants in the Senior Community Service Employment Program (SCSEP). Wages are subsidized by the U.S. Labor Department.

The Labor Department spent \$24,140,000 for the program from July 1, 1975 through March 31, 1976.

SCSEP participants work in a wide variety of activities in such places as day care centers, schools, hospitals, senior citizen centers, and on beautification, conservation, and restoration projects.

The program also provides participants with annual physical examinations, personal and job-related counseling, job

training and, in some cases, placement into regular unsubsidized jobs. Participants' wages average about \$2.40 an

SCSEP is an alternative to welfare. It offers the communities a federally evenly divided, 72 percent were between the ages of 55 and 69.
