State Approves Transit Contract

Yesterday the North Carolina Department of Transportation announced the approval of a contract in the amount of \$315,058 between the State Board of Transportation and the City of Charlotte. These State funds will be used as matching money to complete an existing Urban Mass Transportation Administration Section 3 grant for capital improvements to the Char-

funded. However, the strong participation by the North Carolina Department of Transportation allows the local portion of this grant to be broken down to 10 percent City and 10 percent State. This, in effect, means that the \$630,116 expenditure originally anticipated by the City will be reduced by one-half to \$315,

classes will begin on June 13. There will be only one session of classroom work which consists of 30 hours. Classes will meet 2 hours daily, Monday through Friday, 3 - 5 p.m. After the first week, classes will be scheduled in the morn-

All classroom work will be completed on July 1. Classes will be held at all senior high schools with the exception of North Mecklenburg.

In addition to these classes, there will be an afternoon class at Harding High School from June 20-July 8, 1:15 - 3:15 p.m. daily. Students must be enrolled in regular summer school to attend this class.

Behind-the-wheel instruction will be scheduled on an individual basis after successful completion of classroom attend a 12-hour range phase and then three hours on-theroad instruction.
