QUESTION:
Why does hair break

ANSWER:
Hair is dead after it leaves the scalp. It must be treated and cared for to stop damage and breakage on a regular basis. The life of a hair may be a few months or several years; an eye lash, about 2½ to 4½ months; to a scalp hair up to five years. Hair is shed more during the hot summer months. Maybe 50 to 150 hairs a day, that are hopefully, with care, replaced.

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
