

Tip-Off Tournament Begins Hot Bulls Tangle

With Barber-Scotia

Coach Jerry Fitch will lead his Golden Bulls of Johnson C. Smith into this weekend's Tip-Off Tournament with all eyes on the Championship Trophy. The Golden Bulls go into the tournament, which is being played at Charlotte's Park Center, with a 2-1 record. Their only loss coming last weekend at the hands of LeNoir-Rhynne College, 83-82. It was a last second loss in a well played game. But the Bulls have two very impressive wins under their belt to date, a 102-82 win over Belmont Abbey and a 115-78 victory over arch-rival Barber-Scotia.

Friday night at 9 the Golden Bulls go up against defending Tip-Off Tournament Champion and Arch-Rival Barber-Scotia College of Concord. The action starts at 7 with St. Augustine College going against Allen University of Columbia, S.C.

Even though Fitch's Golden Bulls have defeated Barber-Scotia soundly already this season, Scotia's Assistant Coach John Thomas says "we will be ready come Friday night." "Johnson C. Smith is our rival and our boys will be up for the game." "There is never a problem getting up for Smith" said Thomas. He also added that Reggie Williams should be ready, "Reggie has been plagued by an injured knee that has been giving him problems." The big 6'9" Senior from Atlanta, Ga. has been badly missed by Barber-Scotia this season. Last season Reggie shot 50 percent from the floor and 74 percent from the free throw line with 492 rebounds, a lofty 17.6 average per game, while adding 12 points per contest.

So far this season (thru Dec. 12) Reggie has played in only three games scoring 10 points, and collecting only seven rebounds. Thomas said "with Reggie hurt, we are playing a lot of freshmen." "It's just a matter of finding the right combinations." Thomas faulted last weekend loss to the Golden Bulls on just being cold from the floor and "rushing things," (not waiting to get into our patterns). Anyway Thomas assures us a good defense of the title from the Sabers of Barber-Scotia.

not taking the Sabers lightly, even though Barber-Scotia has a record of 1 win and 5 losses. "We will be working just as hard if they were 5-1" says Fitch.

The Bulls feel they have the power to take this year's tournament. Herb Entzminger leads the team in scoring with a 26.1 average. Followed by playmaker Sonny Proctor with a 16 point per-game average Charles Stewart is shooting at a 15.1 clip. The Bulls are also blessed with balance scoring with Charlotte's William "Duke" Harris is chipping in 14 points a game and the fifth starter, Robert Terry is averaging 10 points per contest.

The Golden Bulls are experienced, quick and talented. One observer said last weekend during the WBTV Carolina Classic that "Johnson C. Smith Golden Bulls are so fast that they could cut off the lights and be in bed before it gets dark." Any way the Bulls do look impressive and will be hard to beat on anybody's court this year.

On Saturday the losers play at 7 and Friday night's winners will play afterwards for the coveted title.

Time 11 a.m. and 7 p.m. You are to fast from daybreak until 12 noon. Prayer is very important. We must be praying from 11 a.m. until 12 noon and the Word of God in the 7 p.m. service. Elder Moore was very upset, but I told him I had to obey the Holy Ghost. I will lose a considerable amount of money by leaving the revival early, but I must obey God. The Lord is saying so many good things to me on this Thursday, the 8th of December, as I write to you, that I wish it was possible to share all of them with you; but unfortunately it is not possible.

Let me say to each of you again, that will receive this letter that you must be present in both the 11 a.m. and the 7 p.m. service. No excuse will be accepted, your failure to attend will cut off many good things God has enstore for you. Someone will say, "I never get anything out of these services." But, you must ask yourself the question, "Do I really carry out what the man of God says?" Upon receiving this letter repeat the following prayer 30 times, before next Thursday.

(★ ★ FATHER IN THE NAME OF JESUS, DO IT AGAIN! ★ ★)

WOE UNTO YOU if you fail to obey. But, everyone that will obey will be lifted from oppression, depression, and burdens. If I asked you to bring a certain amount of money and told you that you would be blessed for doing so, many of you would do it.
