

City Government Announces Christmas Holiday Schedule

To assure city employees the chance to enjoy the holidays with their families, Charlotte City government has announced the following schedules for Christmas and New Year's.

The week before Christmas

all City government offices will be closed on Friday, December 23.

Due to the four day work week, the Sanitation Division will provide the following services:

Each resident in the City will receive two backyard garbage collections on a Monday-Wednesday and Tuesday.

Thursday schedule.

No trash should be placed curbside as there will be no curbside trash collection during the week.

The York Road Landfill will be open from 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. Dec. 19 - 22 and until 1 p.m. Dec. 23. It will be closed Saturday, Dec. 24.

The animal Control Department located at 2700 Toomey Ave. will remain open on Friday, Dec. 23 from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. However only emergency services will be provided.

The week after Christmas all City government offices will be closed on Monday, Dec. 26 and there will be no meeting of the Charlotte City Council on that day.

Garbage will follow the same schedule as the week before except there will be special curbside collection.

If your regular garbage collection days are Monday and Thursday, place your trash at the curb by 7 a.m. on Thursday, Dec. 29.

If your regular collection

days are Tuesday and Friday, place items at the curb on Friday, Dec. 30.

The York Road Landfill will be open from 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. Dec. 27 - 30 and until noon on Dec. 31.

The Animal Control Department will remain open on Monday, Dec. 26 from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. with only emergency

services provided.

The week after New Year's will find City government offices closed on Monday, January 2, and no City Council meeting scheduled for that day.

The York Road Landfill will be open from 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. Jan 3 - 7.

North Carolina native Selma Burke, creator of the likeness used on the Roosevelt dime, displays eleven examples of her figurative sculpture at the N.C. Museum of Art's Mary Duke Biddle Gallery for the Blind beginning Dec. 18.

This nationally recognized sculptor has been selected to execute the Mar. Luther King Jr. Memorial Statue planned for Marshal Park and was in Charlotte earlier this year to look at the site where it will stand. It is hoped the statue fund drive, headed by Rev. James Barnett, will successfully culminate on or about January 15, the 49th anniversary of Dr. King's birth.

Although Miss Burke's career as an artist and teacher spans four decades, her first academic training was in nursing. As a nurse-companion to a prosperous New York patron, she received encouragement to develop her talent and interest in sculpture. In New York the artist studied at Cooper Union, Sarah Lawrence College and Columbia University where she received her Masters of Fine Arts in 1941.

Selma Burke was the recipient of several fellowships which allowed her to study abroad. While in Paris she studied with the contemporary French master Aristide Maillol (1861-1944), and her work is evocative of Maillol's influence.

Through her research of the possibilities offered sculptors by native stone, conducted in the late 1930s, American sculptors were encouraged to lessen their dependency on imported materials which were used almost exclusively at that time.

Miss Burke has extended the encouragement she received early in her career to many young artists, principally through the formation of the Selma Burke School of Sculpture in New York and the Selma Burke Art Center in Pittsburgh. The latter was funded by the Carnegie Mellon Institute. She had a one-man exhibition of her work at the Carnegie Museum in 1975.

The sculptor's abilities as a teacher, artist and administrator were recognized by Pennsylvania's Governor Scranton in his appointment of Miss Burke to the Pennsylvania Council of the Arts. She served as a council member for 10 years under three consecutive administrations.

"The Sculpture of Selma Burke" continues at the N.C. Museum of Art's Mary Duke Biddle Gallery for the Blind through Jan. 22, 1978. The museum is open Tuesdays through Saturdays, 10 a.m. - 5 p.m.; Sundays, 2 - 6 p.m.; and admission is free.
