The Academy Award winning film, "Harlan County, U.S.A.," will play in Charlotte on Saturday, April 15, at the Trade Street YWCA, 418 East Trade Street. The film will begin at 7 p.m. Following the film, Bessie Lou Cornett, who appears in the film will speak about the current situation in the coal fields.

The film documents a coal miner's strike against a Duke Power-owned mine at Brookside, Kentucky. Ms. Cornett is treasurer of the United Mine Workers Women's Club of Harlan County, an organization of miners' wives and widows that were active both in the 1974 Brookside strike and in the recent coal strike.

Film director Barbara Kopple lived with the striking miners and their families for two years while making the film. ghetto children. Klugman also brings back some memorable moments in Willie's career, such as his back-to-the-plate catch off the bat of Vic Wertz in the old Polo Grounds in the first game of the 1954 World Series, and the pinch-hit off Rollie Fingers that won an extra-inning World Series game for the Mets in 1973. Some of the guests on the show are Hank Aaron, Tom Seaver, John Broche, Flip Wilson, Bill Cosby, Tony Randall and Charles Schulz.




Attic Sale
