The North Carolina Black Democratic Leadership Caucus with 150 delegates present on Saturday declined to endorse 5-17 of the seven candidates in the party's U. S. Senate primary race on May 2. Caucus chairman Clarence Lightner said, "There were so many factions we decided not to endorse anyone.

Increasing unemployment among blacks in February raised the nation's jobless rate to 6.2 percent in March. Utilities Commission this week to reduce the average customer's fuel charge by 78 cents from \$3.46 per 1,000 kilowatts hours to\$2.78 as a result of a lower coal cost during the recent coal-strike. WBTV Sets Zoo Telethon

The North Carolina Zoo Tefethon will be seen on WBTV, Channel 3 beginning at 11:30 p.m. Saturday, April 15th and continuing until 6 p.m. Sunday, April 16th. The 17½-hour telethon will be interrupted only once, from 11 til 12 noon on Sunday.

The telethon is being held to raise funds to purchase animals for the 350-acre African Veldt, the first permanentexhibit at the North Carolina state zoo in Ashboro. The section will include natural habitat environment for lions, zebras, ostriches, giraffes, elephants, rhinos, baboons, chimpanzees

and cape buffalo. Small animals, birds and plants native to Africa will also be purchased with telethon funds.

As an additional means of raising funds for the telethon, nationally-known American wildlife artist Richard Evans Younger has made 100 limited edition prints of Pcougar and her cubs to be presented to individuals or firms contributing at least \$1,000 to the North Carolina Zoological Society, a non-profit group which raises funds and promotes public awareness of the zoo.

Norman Prevatte, producer of the telethon, promises a continuous flow of entertain ment by talented performers recruited from across the state. Loonis McGlohon will provide the host orchestra, and nationally-syndicated "Authur Smith and the Crackerjacks" will perform at the zoo site. Emcees will be Charlie Gaddy, Ty Boyd and Lee Kinard. Governor Jim Hunt, who has proclaimed the entire week as "North Carolina Zoo Week," will appear on the telethon.

The North Carolina Zoo is owned and operated by the state. More than 1,000,000 people from all 50 states and 22 foreign countries have visited since the doors opened in 1974.
