Gov. Jim Hunt Names 15 To Health Coordinating Council

Gov. Jim Hunt today named 15 new members to the N.C. Health Coordination Council. The Council will meet Sept. 13 at the Howard Johnson's Motor Lodge near Crabtree Valley Mall at 10:30 a.m. New members will receive their commissions at 1:20 p.m.

The Council is composed of 41 members, 40 by the Governor plus a non-voting ex officio member appointed by the Chief Medical Director of the Veterans Administration. The Governor's appointees include 16 at-large members and four members from each of the state's six Health Service Areas.

The new at-large members include Dr. Jane G. Elchlepp of Durham, Dr. Christopher C. Fordham, III, of Chapel Hill, Alonzo W. Gill of Lexington, Rev. Webster E. Lytle of Hickory, Dr. John L. McCain of Wilson, Mrs. Katherine G. Stern of Greensboro and Dr.

Carlton V. Winter of Charlotte.

Dr. Elchlepp is the assistant vice president for Health Affairs, Planning and Analysis at Duke University. She is a re-appointee to the Council.

Dr. Fordham is the dean of the School of Medicine at the University of N.C. at Chapel Hill. He is a member of the American Federation for Clinical Research, the Southern Society of Clinical Investigation, the American Association for the Advancement of

Science and the N.C. Medical Society. He is a re-appointee to the Council.

Max G. Padgett of Spindale, the Rutherford County Manager, will represent Health Services Area I. He is a member of the Western Carolina Health Systems Agency Board of Directors, the Isothermal Planning and Development Commission, the Rutherford-Polk Area Mental Health Board and is chairman of the Region Criminal Justice Policy Board.

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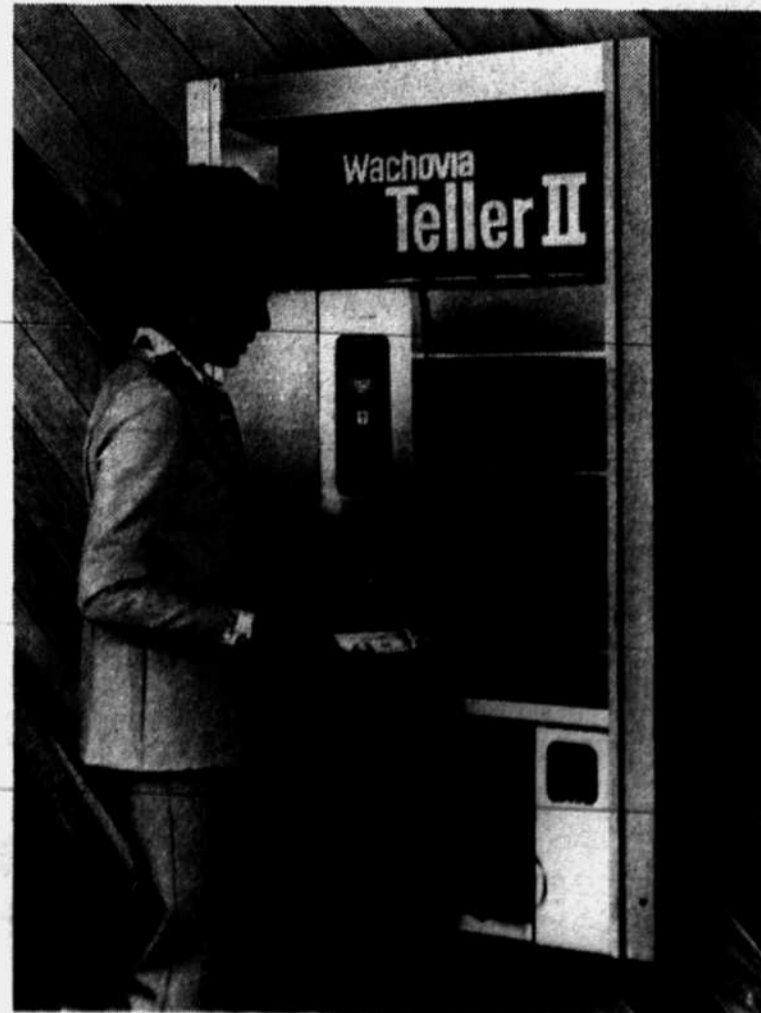
