Top O' Day Goes To Cherokee

Emma Taylor, an expert basket weaver from the authentic Cherokee village of Oconoluftee, chats with C. J. Underwood on Top O' The Day, Wednesday, November 8 at noon on WBTB, Channel 3.

Ms. Taylor, who is of Cherokee descent, is so gifted at her chosen trade that earlier this year she was invited to demonstrate her basket weaving talents in Tokyo, Japan at a world wide craft exhibit.

The art of basket weaving is a Cherokee tradition shared for generations as well as the various techniques for basket weaving as the dyeing method. Ms. Taylor explains that different colors are gotten by using strips of white oak that

have been dipped in vats of boiling natural herbs.

To say the least, C.J. was most impressed, not only by Ms. Taylor's beautifully weaved baskets, but also by a heritage as vital to American as that of the Cherokee Indian.
