The Lions entertain the East Burke Cavaliers of Morganton, N.C. in a game Friday at 8 p.m. in Memorial Stadium.

West Charlotte scored earlier on a 41 yard romp by Henderson Threatt to get by Ashbrook in the first round. Ashbrook defeated East Burke earlier in the season by a 7-6 score.

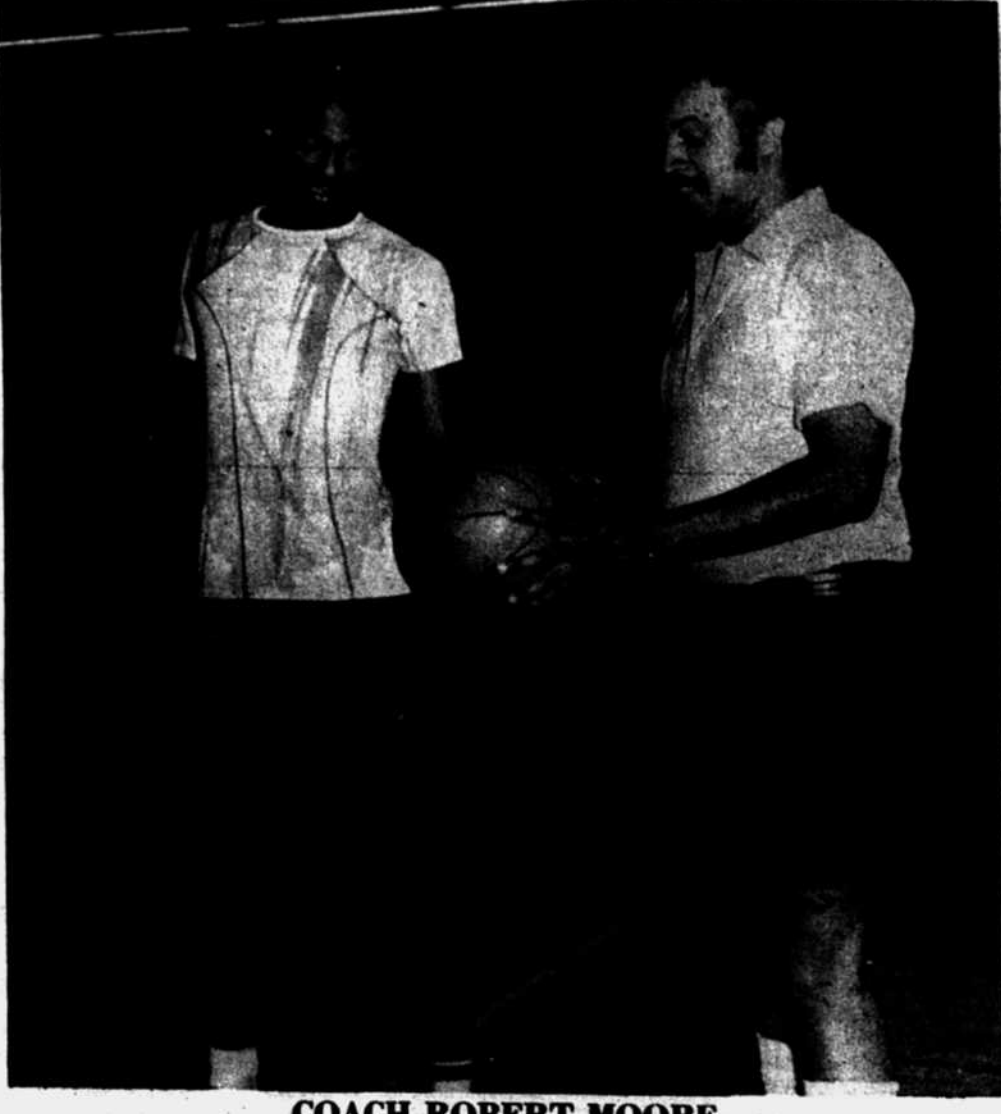
The Cavaliers, now 9 and 2, feature tight end Jerry Baker and quarterback Scott Martin on offense and Dave Sain and Eddie Mullen on defense as linebackers.

The Cougars will play the West Montgomery Warriors in Mt. Gilead at 8 p.m. Friday.

Kilgore To Anchor Golden Bulls

Melvin Kilgore, 6-5 junior from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania is expected to anchor the Golden Bulls of Johnson C. Smith University basketball team in their quest for another trip to the CIAA championships in Hampton, Va. in February.

Kilgore and 6-4 Thomas "Fly" Williams are the Bulls that will be called upon to check the opponent offensive strength according to new basketball Coach Robert Moore, who takes Jerome Fitch's place.

"Freshmen will be called upon immediately to help us out," said Moore. "We don't have that many returning starters coming back and we have a lot of inexperience."

Moore is a connoisseur of wide open offense and pressure defense.

He comes to Smith from Virginia Union. His clubs went 93-41 over a six year period.

He has his work cut out for him as the Bulls are coming off a 10-17 season.

Kilgore Moore said, "He has really come into his own. He is the key to our inside game. He is a tremendous competitor and leaper."

"Williams is a great leaper and the strongest defensive player on the team," said Moore. "His job, this year, will be to contain the opponent's leading scorer."

The freshmen coming into the Bullpen are tough.

Williams Tibbs, a 6-6 forward from New York led his high school to the state 3A title finals where they lost in the finals. He led the team in a scoring with 23.4 points per game and rebounding with 14.3 points per game.

Billy Wayne Simmons, a 6-5 wing from Little Rock, Arkansas went to Hall High where All-American Sidney Moncrief of Arkansas University graduated. He was All-State in the Razorback State.

Three freshman wing Phillip Flores comes to Smith from Houston, Texas where he went to Worthington High. He can pass, score and play all-around ball.

Lowell Oliver is a 6-7 freshman forward from Leesburg, Va. He was recruited heavily by Virginia Tech.

Louis Lowery of Winston-Salem is a 5-10 point guard who led East Forsyth High School to a 24-2 record. He is a playmaker who can score.

Kevin Lewis, 6-4 freshman wing from Miami, Florida was All-City for Miami Killon High.

Steve Kinard of Charlotte is a 6-5 wing who attended South Mecklenburg.

Livingstone Cancels Its Final Game

SALISBURY,--The Football contest between Delaware State College and Livingstone College slated for November 18, in Dover, Delaware, has been officially cancelled.

In response to Dr. Luna I. Mishoe, President of Delaware State College, Dr. F. George Shipman, President of Livingstone College, has agreed to excuse Delaware State from playing the contest this year.

The agreement was made upon the contingency that the exciting contract between the two institutions to play Livingstone, on November 17, 1979 be honored.

Delaware State had to seek cancellation of the game for having played an outside scrimmage with Salisbury State College in addition to their eleven game schedule.

According to NCAA rules, an institution cannot partici-

pate in more than eleven scheduled contests with outside competition (including Alumni) in any one year, excluding spring scrimmage and post-season games permitted by the NCAA outside scrimmages are counted in the eleven contest limit.

The cancellation leaves Coach Andrew Littlejohn's Fighting Bears with a season record of 5-4-1 overall marking winning slate in his initial season at the helm.
