Special Project Teaches Sharing To Young Children

Seven young children had an opportunity to learn about sharing during a special project for the Charlotte "Butterflies," (children aged 2-5), of the Jack and Jills of America. When the youngsters, accompanied by their mothers met at the home of co-chairman Mrs. Patricia Dowdy on Tues., Nov. 21, they brought with them plenty of non-perishable foods to help fill a Thanksgiving Food basket for a family in need in their community.

Highlighting the evening, Mrs. Dowdy related a brief story of "The First Thanksgiving" along with an explanation of Thanksgiving customs to the children who were costumed in Indian headdress.

The project, co-chaired by both Mrs. Dowdy and Mrs. Thelma Walton, helped remind the children of the importance of sharing at Thanksgiving and all-year-round.

Each month, the "Butterflies" participate in a planned activity, such as their November community service project.

Accepted for national membership in 1957, the Charlotte branch of the Jack and Jills of America offers activities for boys and girls of all age groups—the youngest being the "Butterflies."

The main function of this organization is "to aid in the development of the fully integrated child physically, socially, religiously, educationally, emotionally and through recreation; to aid mothers in learning more about their children through careful study; to help children less fortunate than our own; and to support all national legislation aimed at improving conditions for all children."

The Jack and Jills of Charlotte will celebrate "Christmas Around the World" on Dec. 8. Members of each branch will prepare foods from individual countries for a seasonal feast.

RALEIGH—Governor Jim Hunt announced that a center for older adults will now be a reality for the town of Cramerton. Federal funds in the amount of \$60,000 have been allotted under Title V of the Older Americans Act, through the N.C. Division of Aging, for renovation of a building to be used as a focal point for activities and programs to serve the 22,000 older citizens of Gaston County. There will be arts and crafts, including quilting, thermopainting and embroidery.

Second Lieutenant Linwood Mason, Jr., admissions advisor for the Minority Affairs Division at the United States Air Force Academy, is seeking qualified minorities to attend the Academy. Lieutenant Mason, a 1978 graduate, is responsible for the north-east region of the United States, which includes Indiana, Ohio, West Virginia, Virginia, Maryland, Delaware, Kentucky, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Washington, D.C.

"The opportunity to attend the Academy is equivalent to a \$110,000 scholarship," Lieutenant Mason said, "Cadets have a chance to earn a bachelor of science degree in one of twenty-three majors and get paid \$345 per month while attending school. They also have a guaranteed career after graduation."

To be eligible for this opportunity a student must (1) be 17 to 21 on July 1, (2) be a U.S. citizen, (3) have high moral character, (4) be unmarried with no dependents, (5) attain at least the following minimum scores on the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) or the American College Test (ACT): 450-Verbal (SAT), 500-Math (SAT), 22-Math (ACT), 19-English (ACT).
