### RJR Introduces Solution

## Cows Don't Give Chocolate Milk

Cows don't give chocolate milk much to the dismay of children and their parents. If they did, there would be no need to use messy chocolate products to flavor the milk.

R.J.F. Foods of Winston-Salem has recently introduced a solution to the problem of untidiness. It's a chocolate flavored syrup called Milk Mate.

The syrup is squeezed directly into hot or cold milk or onto desserts, and the contain-

er remains neat and dripless.

The product requires no refrigeration, comes in a plastic squeeze bottle with a capped nozzle and is packaged in 20 oz. and 36 oz. sizes.

"Our tests showed that in comparison with other milk additives Milk Mate offered consumers several important benefits: better mixing, better chocolate flavor and color, an easier to use package and greater value for their money," said Robert Kroll, president of R.J.F. Foods.

How do children like the product?

When taste tested by children, Milk Mate was preferred three-to-one over other milk additives. Test results also showed that Milk Mate mixes more quickly and completely and is easier for children to use by themselves, according to a report.

The price of a 20 oz. container of Milk Mate ranges from \$1.30 to \$1.40, compared to \$1.49 for a 16 oz. container of a competitive powdered chocolate product.

The new milk additive was originally developed by the Grenadier Chocolate Company of Toronto, and produced in Canada in 1976. Early this year, R.J.F. Foods bought the license to market Milk Mate in the U.S. entering the \$180 million milk enricher industry.

R.J.F. Foods, Inc., a subsidiary of R.J. Reynolds Industries, Inc. also produces Hawaiian Punch, powdered drink mixes, Chun King Oriental food and Vermont Maid Maple Syrup.

# 1979 Vehicle Registration

## Lags Behind Last Year!

RALEIGH.—In addition to being cold, February may also be a costly and worrisome month for many North Carolinians, according to the Division of Motor Vehicles of the state Department of Transportation.

Prospects of standing in long lines or receiving traffic citations for operating vehicles not properly registered may face some citizens, said Elbert L. Peters, Jr., commissioner of Motor Vehicles.

"During the first two weeks of the registration renewal period this year, about 200,000 fewer license plates and stickers had been sold compared to 1978," Peters said, noting that "despite excellent coverage by the news media on the advantages of purchasing early, approximately 36 percent fewer tags and stickers have been sold this year in this initial 14-day period." Sales began January 2.

Leaf Program

Really Picks Up!

The annual vacuum leaf collection program is now over for 1978-79. The season Charlotte residents raked 10,200 tons of leaves to the curb along 1,200 miles of City streets. City crews operation 30 trucks removed 3,000 loads of leaves. Few of the leaves went to the landfill.

"But there are indications that sales have picked up during the past two weeks," he said. "We encourage vehicle owners to purchase their tags or stickers now while the lines are usually short."

Peters said owners who have not received a 1979 renewal card should notify the motor vehicles division immediately by telephone at 919 733-6505 between 8:30 a.m. and 10 p.m. Monday through Friday. A renewal card will be issued and mailed to the vehicle owner.

Stickers or tags may be purchased at branch offices or through the mail from the Division of Motor Vehicles, 1100 New Bern Avenue, Raleigh, N.C. 27697. Peters said "the agency cannot guarantee delivery of tags or stickers

ordered through the mail after February 1."

"If owners receive their renewal card after February 1, they should make their purchases at a nearby branch agency," said Peters, noting that there are more than 100 locations across the state.

Owners who have not received renewal cards may purchase 1979 tags or stickers with last year's card. To save time, Peters suggested owners should line through any incorrect information and print in corrected material prior to going to the branch agency.

Failure to display 1979 stickers on time by midnight February 15 is a misdemeanor. Conviction of this offense may result in cost-of-court fines, which are \$27 in most cases.
