State To Hear

Vernon Jordan

WINSTON-SALEM—Vernon Jordan, National Urban League President, will deliver the Commencement address for the 87th graduation exercise of Winston-Salem State University at 3 p.m., Sunday, May 20 in the Winston-Salem Memorial Coliseum. Close to 370 graduates are expected to march in the ceremony, according to WSSU's registrars office.

During the ceremonies, honorary doctorates will be awarded to Jordan and Dr. Selma H. Burke, educator and artist. Dr. Burke has had a distinguished career in the field of the visual arts, both as a sculptor and a teacher. Her works have been exhibited widely in museums and galleries in the United States and Europe. She is best known, perhaps, for her profile of Franklin D. Roosevelt which appears on the dime. This profile is taken from the bas relief of Roosevelt completed by Dr. Burke when she won the District of Columbia Fine Arts Commission Competition in 1943. The original is a part of the Recorder of Deeds building in Washington, D.C.

Jordan will be appearing as part of the Sam D. Battistone lecture series at WSSU. He has been first executive director and then president of the Urban League since 1972. He formerly served as director of both the United Negro College Fund and the Voter Education Project. Jordan holds a B. A. degree from DePauw University and a J. D. from Howard University School of Law. The Urban League executive serves on the board of Bankers Trust Company, Celanese Corporation, Clark College, John Hay Whitney Foundation, M.I.T. Corporation, J. C. Penny Company, Xerox Corporation and the Rockefeller Foundation.

County Office Will

Observe Independence Day

Mecklenburg County offices will be closed Monday, May 21, in observance of Mecklenburg Independence Day, and Monday, May 28, in observance of Memorial Day.

This includes all units of the Health Department, the Food Stamp Office, the Tax Offices, and the Register of Deeds Office. Day care centers operated by the Department of Social Services will remain open, but all other units of the department will be closed for the two holidays.

All branches of the Public Library will be closed on both Mondays, and the Main Library, 310 North Tryon Street, will also close Sunday, May 27, and will continue to close on Sundays for the rest of the spring and summer.

The Board of County Commissioners, which normally meets the third Monday morning of the month, will not meet

Monday, May 21, but will meet, instead, at 9 a.m., Tuesday, May 22. The meeting will be in the Board Meeting Room, fourth floor, County Office Building.

The new County Health Department Building at 249 Billingsley Road, is scheduled to open for the first time Tuesday, May 22, at 8 a.m. The Health Department building at 1200 Blythe Boulevard closed Friday, May 11 (except the Vital Statistics Division, which remains open through Wednesday, May 16) and all necessary services are being provided the week of May 14-16 at the Health Department building at 2845 Beatties Ford Road.

The two County landfills, Harrisburg Park and Holbrooks Road, will be open both Mondays, on a normal schedule, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. at Holbrooks Road and 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. at Harrisburg Park.
