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Future Teachers Eligible For Loans

Since 1957, 11,181 high school seniors and other undergraduate students interested in entering the public schools as certified teachers have received help in achieving this goals through the Department of Public Instruction's prospective Teacher Scholarship Loan Program.

The loans are usually awarded to students who are sincerely interested in teaching in specific shortage areas. According to State School Superintendent Craig Phillips, the loans are awarded with due consideration to such factors and circumstances as aptitude, purposefulness, scholarship, character, financial need, and areas of subjects of instruction in which the demand for teachers is greatest.

Priorities will be given to applicants who plan to teach in key areas such as speech and hearing, visually handicapped, mental retardation, hearing impaired, crippled, learning disabilities, gifted, reading, math, and the sciences.

Applications received by March 1 will be reviewed first and awards will be announced the early part of May

Awards for the P.T.S.L. Program have been in the amount of \$900 per academic year since 1975 and are limited to undergraduate study. The maximum number of years a recipient may participate in this program is four years.

A recipient has seven years to repay the loan through teaching in the public schools, or a federal school located in North Carolina One year of the loan is repaid for each year taught by a recipient. If a

recipient does not repay the loan by teaching, he-she must repay the principal of the loan plus interest.

Because of the shortage of teaching jobs available and other factors prospective teachers have been given an extension on the time allocated to repay the loan.

Recipients of a Scholarship Loan prior to 1968 received \$350 per regular academic year; recipients of a loan after July 1, 1968 and prior toJuly, 1 1975 received \$600 per academic year when enrolled in a fulltime teacher education program,

and recipients of a Scholarship Loan after July 1, 1975 received \$900.
