The Australian National team is on a tour of the United States in preparation for the 1980 Olympics in Moscow. The Aussies have finished in the top 10 in the last two Olympics. Last year at the World Games they lost to the United States' team by only two points. Since Australia does not have professional basketball, the 12 players who will arrive in Char-lotte will represent their countries' best roundballers.

"I realize that we will be playing against older, more experienced players," commented Moore, "but the experience will be a great opener for us to get in shape for the upcoming CIAA campaign."

#### **Incorrect Interpretation**

The Central Intercollegiate Athletic Association takes full responsibility for the incorrect interpretation of the penalty against Virginia State University in their game against Norfolk State University, Saturday, November 3, 1979 in Norfolk, Virginia

As a result of a questionable call regarding a touchdown made by Virginia State University football player, who made an "interimidating gesture" prior to crossing the goal line and was penalized from the spot of the foul for his actions, which resulted in eliminating the touchdown

The interpretation of Rule 9-2 of the NCAA Football Rule Book was correctly used in making the call, however the Rule itself is contrary to its interpretation and should have had precedence.

Because the score of the game was final based on NCAA rule 1-1, there in no other course of action but to let the score stand.

The conference wishes to apologize to the fans, the players, coaches and the entire Virginia State University family for the resulting consequences of the call.

We would like to emphasize the point that the officials were acting in accordance to the rule interpretation and instructions given them and should not be blamed in any way for the error

Corrective actions have already been taken among all CIAA officials' teams to stick strictly to the rule to insure that a reoccurance of this nature will never take place again. Since there are no other alternatives, the score must stand as played.

Well, the season is over and the North Mecklenburg Vikings have accomplished something no other school has done in the history of the southwestern 4A Conference. They finished with a perfect 10-9 record.

The Vikes accomplished this with a 14.6 points per game average on offense and a 6.5 average on defense. They are worthy opponents to face High Point Central Friday at North Stadium.

Other scoring averages for the season were Harding 17.4, Myers Park 15.7, West Charlotte 15.4, East Mecklenburg 13.4, Olympic 12.7, South 9.4, West 7.7, Independence 7.1 and Garinger 5.6.

Other defensive averages were West Charlotte 3.1, East 6.2, Olympic 7.2, Harding 7.8, Myers Park 11.5, Independence 16.2, Garinger 17.2, West Mec. 18.5, South 20.0.

The Lions led in the scoring margin department with a plus 12.3. They were followed by Harding plus 9.6, East plus 8.3, North plus 8.1, Olympic plus 5.3, Myers Park plus 4.2, Independence minus 9.1, South Minus 10.6, West Meck, minus 10.8, and Garinger minus 11.6.

For the season, I finished with 47 wins and 13 losses for a 78 percent clip. Not bad or as good as I would have liked. In Friday's game, I predict North by 13 over High Point Central. The Vikings should be in the championship game in three weeks.

#### FINAL RANKINGS

1. North Mec.- The Vikes did what they had to do and in the process had a perfect season. Only a state championship could make the Vikes happier.
