The Inner Unity Cable TV Systems, Inc., a joint venture of the Inner City Broadcasting Corp., headed by Percy Sutton, and the Unity Broadcasting Network (National Black Network), headed by Eugene D. Jackson, and the CanWest Communications Corp, of Canada, have filed with the NYC Board of Estimate as Queens Inner Unity Cable Systems, Inc. for the franchise to provide cable TV to the Borough of Queens, a franchise actively sought by Warner Amex, Orthovision, Inc., Cablevision and Gatham Cable Co.


