So, while today's dentists are usually alike in their more thorough understanding of the patient's needs, and how to cope with those needs, they are still different in that they are individuals, even as office managers, airline pilots and bankers are all individuals.

The point is, you surely can find the type of dentist you like, if you try. The only sameness you should notice today is that each will want to restore your oral health to its full potential, with congeniality and openness you probably have never known in the past.

# WBTV To Give Major Awards

WBTV, Channel 3, announces its plan to sponsor major awards to be given to five individuals in the WBTV viewing area for public service benefiting local communities.

The awards, known as Jefferson Awards, were established along with the American Institute for Public Service in 1973 by the Honorable Robert Taft, Jr. and Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis, as co-chairpersons, to honor the highest ideals and achievements in the field of public service in the United States. National awards are granted in five different categories, and in the category "The Greatest Public Service Performed by Private Individuals Benefit-Local Communities," there will be five national winners. The nominees for these awards come from a series of local awards administered and presented by sponsors in local communities across the country. The five winners of the WBTV Jefferson Awards will be eligible to be selected for the national awards.

The nominees should be average citizens who are performing significant public services predominantly without recognition. They can be paid and performing these services full-time, or be acting in a volunteer capacity. Major elected or appointed officials such as go-

vernors and mayors, or individuals of high stature with widespread public visibility should be excluded because they are already substantially recognized and prominent. Also, all individuals undertaking a program national in scope should be excluded. The emphasis is definitely local.

The definition of public service or community service should be broad. Anyone who is helping other people and the community is eligible: people helping senior citizens, the disadvantaged, the mentally retarded; people working to improve the quality of education, the delivery of health care; people expanding recreational and cultural opportunities; people working with children, people protecting the environment, people building jobs in the community, people promoting public safety, drug prevention, etc., are all eligible.

There is no age restriction, and people are eligible to win the

award only once

WBTV invites organizations, clubs or individuals to participate in the nominations. Nomination forms are available at the WBTV Studio, 1 Julian Price Place, Charlotte, N.C. 28208, or can be requested by phone or mail. The nominations must be postmarked no later than Friday, February 6, 1981. The WBTV Jefferson Award Winners will be announced in March, and the national winners during the summer.

The Jefferson Award, named after Thomas Jefferson, is a bronze proof medallion featuring a replica of the Great Scal of the United States of America on the front; the reverse side carries the signatures of Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis and the Honorable Robert Taft, Jr., "In recognition of Outstanding Public Service." The medallions are donated to the American Institute by the Franklin Mint as a public service.
