Morris Brown College basketball coach and athletic director Charles Hardnett quit his post recently, citing "It's been too little monetary compensation and not the best support." Hardnett accepted a position with the Atlanta Parks and Recreation Department because he was "tired of working on a shoestring budget."

Grambling will make history next fall when the Tigers battle Southern Methodist University on the gridiron. It will become the first time the famed Tigers have taken the football field against a predominantly white school during regular season.

They established a new standard for shooting accuracy when Lionel "Gino" Marquetti shot 57. from the floor. Hank Ford's Pirates, who'll return 11 lettermen next year, also hit 49.7 percent of their shots from the field and they connected with 35 of 52 field goal attempts against Southeastern for a sizzling 67.4 percent.

Would you believe the Chicago Bears paid runningback Walter Payton \$325.34 for each yard he gained during the 1980 NFL football campaign? Payton was paid \$475,000 last year. He gained 1,460 yards rushing. In the meantime, the Atlanta Falcons were compensating their backfield duo of Lynn Cain and William Andrews with pittance in comparison. For example, Andrews and Cain did not make \$100,000 between them last fall. But together they rushed for 2,223 yards. Andrews earned \$52,500 and Cain was paid only \$45,000.

The best show in town this summer will be found in Atlanta where the powerful Braves are going to make a serious run for the National League Pennant.

Now that the college basketball season is winding down one wonders if a great deal of pressure will be brought to bear on Virginia's famed sophomore Ralph Sampson. The 7'4" center turned down a bid from the Boston Celtics to turn pro last year. Already the scouts are saying that Sampson does not have the strength to play against the big boys and that his weakness may become more apparent in another year of collegiate competition. Isn't that a cheap way to get a kid to sing?

Johnson C. Smith head football coach Wylie Harris and basketball coach Bob Moore received a unanimous vote of confidence by the Athletic Committee in their March meeting.

"Our athletic program has certainly become more competitive," commented JCSU President, Wilbert Greenfield. "Both head coaches are well received in the community and have represented J. C. Smith values well."

"We're proud of the Southern Division basketball championship," remarked Jack Martin. "I believe coach Harris is building in the direction of a winning football program. It just takes four or tive years of hard work."

The work began in earnest Monday with the start of spring football practice. The annual Blue-Gold game will end the monthlong sessions on Sunday, April 12, at 2 p.m. on campus. Head coach Wylie Harris invites the public out to view the squad that returns 15 starters from last year's 4-7 campaign.

"We're happy to have a good nucleus of experi-enced players back," commented Harris. "We're going to need that experience since we open with four road games out of our first five contests this fall. The 1981 schedule features two new faces in the Elizabeth City State Vikings and the Bowie State Bulldogs, both CIAA members. Virginia Union and Hampton were dropped as CIAA commissioner Bob Moorman initiated a rotating schedule among the conferences' 14 teams. Traditional rivals N.C. A&T, S.C. State, Livingstone and Winston-Salem State return along witg Lenoir-Rhyne, Fayetteville State, Virginia State, U.D.C and defending CIAA champions N. C. Central.
