Familiar Cliche Claims People Are "Born" Leaders

An old and familiar cliche claims that certain people are "born leaders." But how do you convert someone who isn't a born leader into a leader?

The Dean of Students Office at the University of North Carolina at Charlotte thinks it has the answer in its leadership development program.

According to Dean of Students Charles Lynch, "This year with the initiation of the Emerging Leaders program it rounds out the comprehensive leadership program to encourage students to get involved. It gives them a good base."

Sections for established leaders, club presidents and potential leaders comprise the program. Retreats, mixers and off campus leadership exchanges are some of the tools used to teach team building, how to conduct a meeting, fund raising, time management, stress management and a myriad of others. Even a class called Developing Leadership Potential is offered by the college of Human Development and Learning.

The unique aspect of UNCC's leadership development program is the Emerging Leaders pro-

gram. Freshmen and sophomores showing leadership potential during the fall semester are chosen to participate. They go on a retreat, learn about the history and future of UNCC and about the leadership positions on campus. Upper classmen are also paired with the participants in a Mentor program. The upper classmen currently hold leadership positions and show freshmen and sophomores "the ropes."

According to Lynch, Frank Joseph, Director of Commuter Life and Leadership Development is the driving force behind the program.

Student Body President, Polly Purgason agrees. "We have one of the best leadership programs in the South and maybe in the U.S., and it's all because of Frank Joseph," she said.

Joseph himself plays down his importance, sidestepping questions aimed at him, but talking endlessly of the program.

"So what makes a leader?" Joseph says. "It's somebody with a cause and the initiative to do something about it."

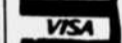
