The theme for North Carolina Central University's sixth annual Helen G. Edmonds History Colloquium is "The Black Church in Historical Perspective." Topics to be covered include the involvement of the black church in political and civic affairs.

The program includes morning and afternoon sessions on Friday, March 5, a luncheon at 12:15 Friday, Saturday (March 6) morning sessions and a banquet on Saturday evening at 7 p.m. Both the luncheon and the banquet are at the W. G. Pearson Cafeteria.

Other sessions are at the Alfonso Elder Student Union with the exception of one at White Rock Baptist Church at 7 p.m. Friday.

Saturday's banquet will feature an address by Dr. Charles Lyons, chancellor of Fayetteville State University.

All other conference participants are Ph.D. holders who studied (either at the undergraduate or graduate level) with Dr. Helen G. Edmonds at NCCU. Dr. Edmonds is Distinguished Professor Emeritus of History at NCCU, author of several books, a former member of the United States Delegation to the U.N., a nationally known leader in women's organizations and in the Republican Party.

Topics to be covered in the conference are such areas as black ministers and political activity, education and black ministers, the symbolism of spirituals, and a wide range of biographical and organizational studies.

He is also listed in "Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges."
