WEA Corporation, the distributor of Warner Bros. Records, Elektra-Asylum Records and Atlantic Records, is the largest distributor of records and tapes in the United States.

Droz said that the new price will be the lowest in five years to con-sumers for comparable product. The price reduc-tion applies to selected catalog in release for approximately one year.

Winters Achieves Inspite

Of Physical Hindrances

From misfortune, growth, courage and determination often times spring forth.

Entertainers like Ray Charles, Stevie Wonder and Ronnie Milsap despite their handicap, and probably because of their physical limitations have given the world music so sensitively creative that had they not been impaired in some manner, the world may have otherwise been deprived.

Add entertainer Robert Winters of Robert Winters and Fall to the list of those who achieve in spite of a major physical hindrance. Confined to a wheelchair since age five Robert Winters has overlooked his personal difficulty and has risen to a status where he serves as an inspiration to those who cry, "I can't." Winters' total existence roars "I must."

He began singing at the urgence of his sisters. Com-

munity church groups were among the first type of experience Winters gained in music. Later as music became more a part of his life he sang with a local accapella group in clubs, canteens, talent shows and anywhere else they could find a stage.

A move to California in 1973 was a year of diversity for Winters. Although he continued to sing in churches he began singing mainstream pop and R&B music as well.

Surpassing the stage of being a vocalist of incredible range and versatility Winters is also an accomplished songwriter and a talented multi-instrumentalist playing among other instruments, keyboard, guitars and bass.

While in the process of trying to get his own music recorded Winters expanded his experience by playing with such top performers as Stevie Wonder, Larry Graham and having his songs recorded by The

Fifth Dimension and Walter Jackson.

Meeting Walter Turner, background singer and chief inspiration behind Winters' group Fall proved to be the turning point in Winters' professional career. Through Turner Wintes met Jimmy Bee of Bee-Alexander Productions and the eventual result was the chart-topping single and album "Magic Man."

Steadily and consistently making his mark in the field of entertainment, Winters was the subject of an award-winning TV documentary, "Introducing Robert Winters," named a winner in the music category at the Sixth Annual Oscar Michaeux awards ceremony of the Black Filmmakers Hall of Fame, singing the "National Anthem" at a Los Angeles Radiers game.
