A pair of masterpieces written almost 200 years apart will be performed January 15 by The Oratorio Singers of Charlotte in the group's first 1963 con-

The works are Mozart's "Requism," first performed in 1793, and Leonard Bernstein's 1965 "Chichester Psalms." They will be sung by the 160-voice Oratorio Singers under the direction of Dr. Mary Nell Saunders, who also will conduct The Charlotte Symphony Orchestra in the performance at Charlotte's Oven's Auditorium. The works are Mozart's Oven's Auditorium.

Tickets are available for the January 15 performances and a May 7 concert featuring Metropolitan Opera bass Jerome Hines. Single performance tickets are 19, except for senior citizens and students, for whom the price is \$5. Tickets for both concerts are \$15 and \$9. They may be obtained at the Oratorio office in Spirit Square, 110 East 7th Street and at the Spirit Square Box Office.

The Mozart masterpiece will feature four soloists: soprano Carol Webber of Seattle, mezzo-soprano Alyce Rogers of Portland, Oregon, tenor William Mc-Donald of New York City and baritone Wayne Lail of Durham.

Boy soprano David Daniels of Spartanburg will be the featured soloist in "Chichester Psalms." Miss Webber, Miss Rogers, Mc-Donald and Lail also will have solo roles in the per-

The "Requiem Mass in D Minor" is regarded as Mozart's best-known sacred work, and he is said to have told his wife that it was to be his own funeral mass. However, he died in December 1791 after completing only two move-ments and his widow turned to a Mozart pupil, Franz Sussmayr, to write the remaining sections.

Phil Arrington. In addition, Channel 36 will produce an hour-long edited special to run 9-10 p.m. following the race and also will originate a halfhour show live at 7:30 p.m. from the pre-race Runners' Clinic Friday evening pre-ceding the Martahon from

the Civic Center. "We feel the Observer Marathon is a major event in this city that deserves attention," said Arrington. "We have significantly increased our production ef-fort for the 1983 race from our first experience in tele-vising it live last year and believe it may well represent the largest local live production effort in the Carolinas."

"In fact," Arrington added, "as far as we can tell Charlotte may be one of only five or six cities na-tionally in which a local

in its entirety. We con-tacted two national running magazines and they were only aware of similar productions in Boston, New York, Atlanta, San Francisco and Chicago, although no one seems to officially compile such in-formation."

WPCQ's production faci-lities for "See How They Run '83" will include utilikun '83" will include utili-zation of a 45-foot tractor-trailer rig equipped as a "self-contained mobile TV station" which will trans-mit directly from the up-town Charlotte finish location with powerline hook up. Last year, the station relied upon microwave sig-nals exclusively from up-town to its tower some 12

miles northeast.

More than 70 people will be involved in the production, utilizing 10 live cameras, some 9,500 feet of cable and multi-telephone hookups at three primary course locations in addition


