Proper Mowing Practices

A homeowner should think of mowing as more than just cutting his lawn on a weekly basis. Mowing is actually a defoliation process in which a portion of the grass plant's leaf is removed. Remember, the leaf is the source of photosynthesis, (a plant's food manufacturing process). Mowing has a strong impact on the overall health of the turfgrass plant.

Two factors should be considered to insure a lawn is dense, uniform and attractive; mowing height and frequency.

Mowing too short is perhaps the most serious and common mistake in caring for lawns, included among the negative aspects of cutting below a recommended mowing height are reduced root growth, plant vigor and wear tolerance.

Lawns containing bluegrasses, fescues and rye-grasses should be cut at a height of at least two inches. Southern lawns which are predominately bermudagrass or zoysia-grass should be cut at an approximate height of one

Mowing frequency, or the interval between mowings, is determined very simply by the growth rate.

Remove no more than onethird of the leaf's area at a time. This would mean that for a two inch mowing height, the lawn should be cut again before it reaches approximately 3 inches in height.

The principle with frequency is to mow according to the rate of growth, not the calendar. This may mean mowing a lawn twice a week during the sprin and fall when growing con-ditions are ideal.
