UNCF & \$250,000 Better Off

Special To The Post .Chicago, IL - The United Negro College Fund is \$250,000 better off from a corporate donation it received Sunday - 16 cubic feet of hard cash.

Delivered by armored car, the gift to the Fund was paid in one-dollar bills at the Ebony Fashion Fair in Chicago's McCormick Place auditorium. If stacked, the money would reach almost 125 feet in the air, or about the height of a 10-story building.

"I seem to have forgotten my checkbook," Marshall B. Bass, vice presi-dent of R. J. Reynolds Industries, said in presenting his company's contri-

bution. "Perhaps you would be willing to accept cash?"

According to Bass, Reynolds Industries chose to present its 1983 contribution to the United Negro College Fund in this unusual manner to encourage others to support historically black colleges and universities. The cash donation is the first payment made by Reynolds Industries on its \$1 million commitment to the Fund
