Former Olympic High basketball star Chris Brown is averaging 22.6 points per game for Jacksonville Texas Junior College. He is also averaging seven assists per game.

"As a team we were 8-1-1 and could have been 11-4," he said. "We were playing before 81,000 fans in Death Valley (home of the Tigers) and that was exciting."

Boyer earned a starting position on the run-oriented team and made nine catches for 114 yards and returned two kickoffs for 12 yards.

Academically he is a sophomore, but athletically he is a freshman after being red-shirted for a year.

Majoring in early childhood education, the 6'2", 185 pound 20 year-old believes that the T next edition of the Tigers will be a contender.

"We have recruited very well and I am a man who likes to work my way to the top," he informed.

This year, he is not going to participate in football if he believes that he is jumping well enough to qualify for the Olympics.

For Boyer, the indoor track season begins on January 13. He follows the indoor track season with the outdoor track season and hopefully his major goal, the Summer Olympics.

"I would very much like to represent my country and Clemson University in the Summer Olympics," he said.

Workman was the quarterback for the North Carolina team in the Shrine Bowl.

Workman is presently the leading scorer in the Southwestern 4A Conference, averaging 17.8 points per game.

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line. The literacy tests were banned and the Act also provided victims who were denied the right to vote the opportunity to go to court to seek judicial remedies. The Voting Rights Act was amended in 1985, 1970, 1975 and 1982.

The pamphlet explains in detail sections 2 and 5 of the Voting Rights Act. Section 2 is important because it prohibits discrimination in voting that reaches all voting practices regardless of when they may have been enacted. It provides that "no voting practice or procedure may be used which 'result' in the denial or abridgement of the right to vote on account of race, color or membership in a language minority."

ACLU discusses specific kinds of voting practices which are prohibited by section 2. It also points out how to prove a violation of section 2.

Section 5 is the preclearance requirement which orders any jurisdiction to submit proposed changes in election procedures to the Attorney General. The proposal must be accompanied by supporting information to show that the change is not discriminatory in purpose or effect. Specifications are also highlighted in the pamphlet on section 5.

If you aren't familiar with all the provisions of the Civil Rights Act, and would like more detailed information, write the American Civil Liberties Union, Public Information and Education Department, 125 W. 43rd St., New York, N.Y. 10036. The pamphlet is free.

Because Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. recommended the vote as one means to overcome racial oppression, how might be a good time to review your voting rights, and to learn how to handle a situation in which you might be discriminated against in your efforts to vote.
