cians who were never known by anything but Simon and Ceasar. "The earliest practices of medicine-began in Africa, and people like Simon and Ceasar prepared a rich feast of ideas and practices in medicine," Dawkins claimed.

As he pointed out in his research paper, it's unfortunate while Simon and Ceasar were significant in the preparation of the medical feast, they were never "allowed to eat at the table and benefit from ' their contributions." Dawkins has been selected on an achievem for The

society. "In spite of the way we (blacks) came to America and in spite of our suppression inherent by slavery, we have contributed to music, science, literature, politics and more," Dawkins insisted. "This needs to be written in the history books and taught to people, so if for no other reason, it will serve as a point of inspiration to our present generation."

Since black history can't be found in the average reference materials, Dawkins believes "the whole gamut-everything in black achievement-should be taught in the home."

"I don't blame the public school system entirely," Dawkins admitted. "Blame begins in the home. As John Hope Franklin once stated, 'I put blame for children's lack of knowledge of black history in the home. Don't leave it up to the school system."

"All indications reveal black men discovered the American continent long before Columbus sailed the ocean blue in 1492," Dawkins pointed out. He added, "Columbus just left his family here."

These are the kinds of facts which Dawkins believes no one should grow up not knowing, even if they're not taught in school.

Dawkins, a medical doctor and surgeon, completed his fellowship training at.

Howard University, He received his bachelor of science degree at North Carolina Central University, and was an intern at Harlem Hospital Center. He also attended Bowman Gray School of Medicine and Kalamazoo Medical School.

School. Dawkins and his wife, Hazel, spend hours of their time in their home reading from their collection of black history books. Reading about black history is leisure reading for him. He is a member of the Book of the Month Club and the Barnes-Noble Book Club. "The rare black history books, I get from the Afro-Caribbean Book Club located in Charlotte."

"One day I'd like to own the largest collection of black history books," Dawkins revealed. His favorite book is "Before the Mayflower," by Lerone Bennett, and his favorite story is about Harriet Tubman, also written by Bennett. The Dawkins' have one


The Dawkins' have one son, Rosamuel, III, and they have already pledged to teach him history with no deletion of blacks' participation.

When Dawkins first decided to open his business closer to the community which he serves, he re-



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
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ceived support from black doctors already established in the area. "Drs. E. L. Rann and Spence Durante have practices on Beatties Ford Road, but they supported my efforts," Dawkins stressed. From the onset, he knew he wanted to prolve as

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the development. "I made a concerted effort to get as many blacks involved as I could," Dawkins remarked. Dawkins said be is_ pleased to be located in an area which blacks work in and control. These are the kind of active efforts which Dawkins described as significant in noting history. Black history needs to be taught in the homes on a daily basis, in the churches on a weekly basis, and certainly on a national scale. He feels that history books need to be rewritten "with the proper perspective." preciates the awareness which Black History Month sparks, he is hopeful more attention will be devoted to the topic as an everyday lesson.



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
