Jo Jo is a veteran funk-n-roller. For the past two years, she has been singing with Rick James. In the group, the Mary Jane Girls, Jo Jo is lead singer. An authentic Mary Jane Girl, Jo Jo describes, her experience of working with Rick as "challenging and wonderful."

Next is Cheri. Described as the "baby in the group, Cheri has appeared in several off-Broadway shows

including presentations of "Wait Until Dark" and "The Bad Seed." Having studied dance, drama and voice, Cheri has also worked both in front and behind the camera on television commercials.

Candi's singing career began for her at the age of nine. At 25, Candi's experience includes work as a songwriter and backup work with Smokey Robinson, Johnny Bristol and Marilyn McLeod.

It was upon Candi's suggestion that Maxi decided to audition for the Mary Jane Girls. Labelled as the most outrageous" member of the group, Maxi has studied singing and

dancing and apprenticed in various cabaret groups around the Pittsburgh area.
