With these improve-ments in viewing and re-cording the blood flowing through the tiny vessels of the heart, doctors can spot blocked blood vessels more easily and can make a more definitive diagnosis of heart problems.

All X-rays receive the best exposures because they are controlled by com-puters, according to Chuck Williams, chief technolo-gist in Mercy's Cardiology

Laboratory. Other features of the ca-theterization unit include a heart monitor that uses a computer to measure blood

flow through the heart and the heart valves. An electrocardiogram monitor (EKG) simultaneously measures heart rate.

"With this state-of-theart equipment, there are many benefits to patients and physicians," Mr. Will-iams said. "Physicians have an increased ability to

provide quality studies. The computer assisted generators and monitors are major factors in increasing the accuracy of the diagnosis. Patients also benefit from shorter procedure time and are

exposed to less radiation. The average catheteriza-tion procedure normally

takes about one hour, but the procedure can be completed in about 45 minutes with the new unit."


The unit recently in-stalled is one of two heart catheterization units at the hospital. The first unit, which is an earlier model, has been in operation since 1976.
