Diagnostic And Treatment

Center Under Construction

Presbyterian Hospital is about to begin construction of a three-story, \$12.5 mil-lion addition to its Diagnostic and Treatment Center of Fourth Street.

When the project is comnleted in late 1985, Presbyterian for the first time will offer open-heart sur-gery supported by a new heart catheterization laboratory and acute psychiatric services. The new addition also will house a new labor and delivery suite, a new neonatal intensive care unit (NICU) and an enlarged Respiratory Therapy Department.

"We are extremely pleased that we will soon be offering these new and im-proved services," says Presbyterian Hospital President Byron L. Bullard. "Services like these demonstrate our commitment to superior patient care and our flexibility to meet changing demands in a cost effective way."

With almost 5,000 births annually, Presbyterian has the second largest obstetric service in the state. The existing labor and delivery suite, which opened in 1976, is overcrowded and located on a separate floor from the post-partum unit and

the nursery. With the new suite, all newborn services will be on the sixth floor. The new suite is designed to pro-mote family centered maternity care. In the low

risk area, all rooms will be designed so that labor, delivery, recovery and bonding may take place in the same location. There also will be a

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
