

Marsh Explains

Use Of Various Hair Ornaments

Feathers, decorated combs, bands of different widths, colors and textures, sequined skullcaps—these are just a few of the many types of hair ornaments with which to adorn your head, accent your outfit — or hide your hair.

Leola Marsh, owner and manager of D'Essence Hair Design Salon, recently demonstrated the use of various hair ornaments at her shop on West Boulevard.

One, a gold-sequined skullcap, can be worn in different ways to accommodate different face shapes. For instance, wearing the cap to the side will slenderize an oval face, while wearing it straight is more becoming to a thinner face, Ms. Marsh explained.

Feather ornaments can be worn singly or together with others of the same or contrasting colors. Colorful hairsprays which can be combed out can be used to blend the tips of the hair with the feathers or other ornaments.

Decorated combs and barrettes can be worn by themselves or in conjunction with hairpieces to achieve a wide range of looks.

Hair bands can be used not only to achieve a sophisticated look, but also to camouflage hair that's "not up to par," said Ms. Marsh. Many kinds of hairbands can be purchased, or they can be made from any type of material to coordinate with one's wardrobe. The bands, which are often fastened by tying, can double as belts to be worn on the hips, she pointed out.

In addition, ornaments can be added to the bands for a striking effect.

The salon manager asserted that all lengths of hair can be adorned with ornaments. And, by varying not only the ornaments, but how each is used, many different fashion looks can be achieved.
