The higher heels Edwards says are so fashionable are three to four inches. The conservative two-inch heel is the most popular height for pumps and career shoes. "With 55 percent of Charlotte's women working, two-inch heels are very popular here," he notes.

Shoes that come with their own removable bows prove quite versatile. A party shoe can be transformed into a pump suitable for the office the next morning by simply removing the bow.

their shoes to match their gowns. "Years ago, ladies preferred to dye their shoes," he recalls. "That's become very popular again." Shoes for dying can be of such fabrics as oeau de soie, crepe, or satin. At Edwards' store, "We dye them, with bags to match, to any shade."
