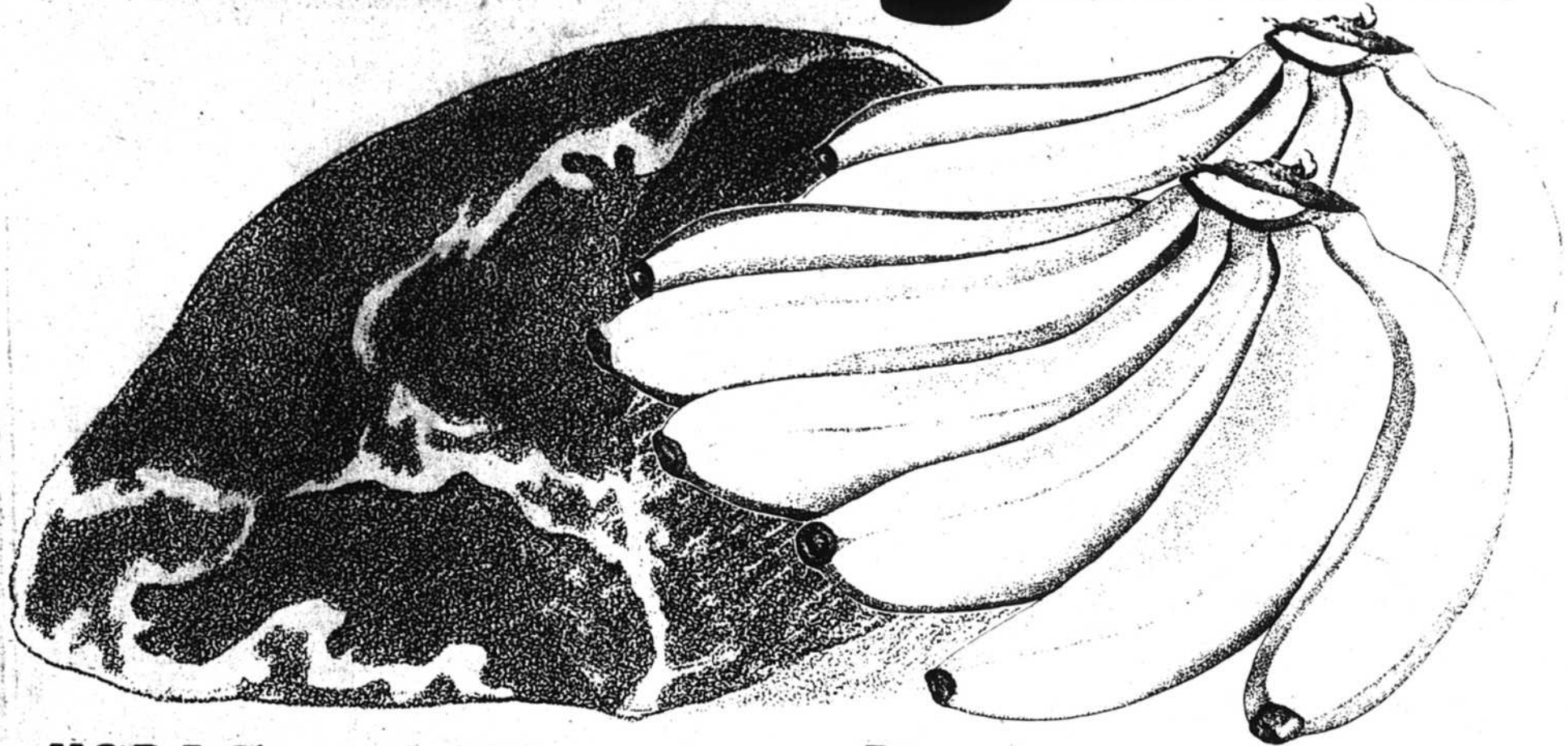

**Eight Blacks Named
 City's Water Bond
 Committee**

Charlotte Mayor Harvey Gantt has appointed eight blacks to a 26-member citizens committee which will conduct an education campaign for the \$18 million City water bond referendum in November.

The Charlotte Water Bond Committee will provide information on the 34-inch feeder main needed to stabilize water pressures for customers of the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Utility Department.

The eight black Charlotte citizens involved in the committee are: William "Pete" Cunningham, business leader and co-chairman of the Bond committee; Willa Cline, member of the Community Facilities Committee; Sa. Young, member of the Citizens' Review Committee; Dr. Wesley Clement, Eddie C. McGirt, Marnite Shuford Perry, Linwood O. Foust, and J.C. Cousar.

In appointing the committee, Mayor Gantt said, "The entire city will benefit from this water project with equalized pressures for the 110,000 customers of the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Utility Department. This committee will conduct an educational program on the need for the new water main and its importance to the health and safety of the community.

"I am especially pleased," the Mayor noted, "that this project has already had extensive discussion by our Citizens' Review Committee. Their involvement, review and suggestions are in our tradition of open participation for all municipal projects.

"Finally," the Mayor concluded, "I hope that all persons interested in this effort will contact the Charlotte Water Bond Committee and volunteer their assistance. Good water delivered efficiently is essential to our excellent quality of life in the Queen City. I hope that on November 5 all Charlotte voters will pull the 'Yes' lever and support the City water bonds."

**Five CMS Students
 Named Semi-Finalists
 For Scholarships**

Five students of Charlotte-Mecklenburg high schools have been included among the approximately 1500 black students who have earned the status of semi-finalists in the National Achievement Scholarship Program for Outstanding Negro Students for 1986.

The students are Angela M. Davis of Charlotte Catholic; Valerie Kornegay and Kevin D. Martin of West Charlotte; and Eva L. Dawkins and Jerome N. Lucky of Myers Park.

These students have the opportunity to continue in the competition for Achievement Scholarships to be awarded next spring when they will be completing their senior years in high school.

The students named as semi-finalists in the 1986 Achievement Program qualified on the basis of their performance on the 1984 PSAT-NMSQT.

To advance in the competition for Achievement Scholarships, semi-finalists must become finalists by meeting a number of additional requirements. These include being endorsed and recommended by the high school principal, having a record of high academic performance and filing an application that contains a self-description of activities, interests and goals.

In mid-February of 1986 students will be notified through their schools as to whether they have reached the finalist level in the competition. Only finalists are considered for Achievement Scholarships.

The National Achievement Scholarship Program for Outstanding Negro Students is now in its 22nd year. This program identifies and honors high-performing black students and annually provides a sizable number of scholarships that are supported by grants from corporations, business organizations and colleges and universities.

In 1986, about 700 promising young men and women will receive Achievement Scholarships worth more than \$2 million.
