County Eligible For Economic Development Loan Program

Mecklenburg County will compete with other counties and localities around the state for Economic Development funds. Projects funded in Mecklenburg County may not re-ceive more than a total of \$750,000.

Mecklenburg County is eligible to receive an allocation of \$750,000 for the year. Business owners or prospective business owners will be allowed to apply for any amount up to the \$750,000 limit. Fifty-one per-cent of the funds awarded for each proposal must benefit low to moderate income people, and a majority of the funds must be directed toward promoting the creation of retention of full-time jobs; enhancing income levels; or providing local ownership opportunities. Funds should ideally be expended in a ratio of \$15,000 to one full-time job, with \$5,000 to one full-time employee being the average ratio range.

This loan program is open to all people regardless of race, creed.

national origin, or disability. "The loans are need-based, and applications are judged on a competitive basis," says Kermitt Waddell, minority affairs director.

"There are a number of things the state will look at in determining who gets the loans - measures of pover-ty, unemployment, and wage rates in the area where the business is located or will be operating, as well as the number of jobs created and the effect the business might have on the community."

Interest rates and lengths of loan

payback are flexible, with the average payback period for working capital being three to five years, and up to 20 years on real property forms of collateral. The interest rates at present for this region acrmally range from five percent up to the prime interest rate.


