City Water Bond

In Charlotte we each use about 110 gallons per day. That's about 50 million gallons treated and pumped daily to the 110,000 customers of the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Utility De-Charlotte-Mecklenburg Utility De-partment. In the summer it is sub-stantially more. There is no pro-blem with the supply of water here. But distributing the water to homes and businesses at adequate pres-sures is becoming a problem. On November 5 Charlotteans will be asked to vote on \$18 million in City Water Bonds. If approved a six-mile, 54-inch water main will be constructed from the northwest part-of Charlotte, through the city to the constructed from the northwest part of Charlotte, through the city to the southeast. Water delivered by the new pipeline will equalize water pressures throughout the system and enhance fire protection. All improvements to the water system are paid for through utility bills. Property tax funds are not used for this purpose.
