## Marguerite Howie To Receive Top Scientist Award

Orangeburg - Marguerite Rogers Howie, professor of sociology and a principal investigator of 1890 Re-search at South Carolina State College, has been awarded the Mor-rison and Evans Outstanding Scientist Award by the Association of Research Directors of 1890 Colleges and Universities. The award was presented at the organization's 10th annual symposium held recently in

The first woman recipient of the association's highest honor, Mrs. Howie was selected from a field of nominees representing 17 historically black land-grant institutions from ly black land-grant institutions from 16 Southern states. The award is presented annually to an outstand-ing scientist and educator who has demonstrated national leadership in a field of agriculturally-related re-search. As a rural sociologist, her research has had its major impact on human resource development on human resource development and improving the quality of life of people in the South.

A native of Wilmington, N.C., professor Howie received her preprofessional educational training at

Boston, and Duke Universities,

Carolina, and the University of Carolina and the University of Ghana. Her multi-disciplinary areas of study encompass sociology, social foundations, gerontology, guidance and cultural anthropology.

As a dedicated and respected researcher, on the state, regional, and national levels, Mrs. Howie has written and or presented a combina-tion of more than 60 articles, papers and bulletins. She has conducted research in areas such as Foundations for Self-Determination; In-Migration and Its Effect on the Quality of Life; Communication and Transportation Effects on Uti-lization of Community Agencies-Resources; and A Use of Know-ledgeables in Rural Research.

Her excellent grantsmanship skills are reflected in the acquisiion of funds in exc from the Kellogg Foundation to develop the Department of Social Sciences at South Carolina State College and from the United States Department of Agriculture for the implementation of state and re-

gional projects.

Mrs. Howie is an active member of the Association for the Study of Afro-American Life and History, Association of Social and Behavioral Sciences, Rural Sociological So-ciety, and Southern Sociological Society. She has served as a con-sultant with Society. Each year since 1982, professor Howie has been awarded a Dis-tinguished Faculty Endowed Chair at South Carolina State College. In 1984, she received the W.E.B. DuBois Award from the Associa-tion of Social and Behavioral Scientists.

As this year's recipient of the Outstanding Scientist Award, the Association of Research Directors presented Mrs. Howie with a commemorative plague and a cash award of \$1,000.
