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IRS Emphasizes Need For Good Records

Greensboro - The Internal Revenue Service requires that you keep records which will enable you to prepare a correct tax return and pay your proper tax. If you keep a record of your expenses during the year, you may find that you are able to reduce your taxes by itemizing deductions. You must keep a record of expenses to support any deduc-tions you claim. Deductible expenses may include a part of your medical and dental bills, interest payments, contributions, taxes, and certain other expenses

According to the IRS, you should keep all sales slips, invoices, re-ceipts, cancelled checks, stock brokerage statements, W-2s, 1099s, and other documents which prove the amounts you show on your return as income, deductions, and credits.

Your record must be kept available for examination by the IRS if your return is selected for an audit. If you have kept good records you should be able to prove any deductions which are questioned. If you have not kept good records, you may have to very more than the province of the have to pay more tax because you cannot prove your deductions.
Usually an audit occurs within

three years after a return is filed. Copies of returns and supporting records should be kept at least three years. For more information on recordkeeping requirements, call 1-800-241-3860 and ask for Publication 552.

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
