Wendy Syndrome Defined As "Learned Behavio

on television spotlights a young attractive woman who proudly sings, "I can bring home the bacon, fry it up in the pan and never, never let him forget he's a man."

Perhaps this woman does do all of that. But does she also try to be "everything" to those people she loves most to the point of neglecting her own needs and desires.

If she does, that woman could very well be a victim of the Wendy

well be a victim of the Wendy Syndrome Quite simply the Wendy Syndrome is defined as learned behavior in which women take care

of other people to the extent of doing their thinking for them or to the point of telling them how to feel and what to do: That definition came from Carole Ricks, a family and marriage therapist. Adding to her definition, Fran Saxon of Woman-Reach remarked, "The woman who suffers from the Wendy Dilemma, takes charge of other people's well being to the extent of denying her-

This behavior, according to both professionals, is imbedded in women as far back as their girlhood.
"Women have long been taught that
if you take care of others then you're responsible, good and caring," stressed Mrs. Ricks.

Neither Mrs. Ricks nor Mrs. Saxon were denouncing any feelings of nurturing. On the contrary, they stressed that there is an appropriateness of having the Wendy Syndrome. Mrs. Saxon cited this example: "When a child is in his or her earliest stages of development, the tendency to nurture and to take care of this infant is definitely in order." Mrs. Ricks agreed, com-menting, "It's only when that type of behavior is excessive or inappro-priate that it becomes dysfunctional. When the woman finds herself doing things for those she loves that they could very well do for themselves, then she has a problem."

More devastating than the Wendy dilemma itself is the general consensus between Mrs. Saxon and Mrs. Ricks that the black woman has been more affected by the Wendy Dilemma throughout history than white women.

"The black woman has been taught to take care of her children, other people's children, her household and other households. For the black culture to survive the effects of slavery the black woman has had to be the one to do the

healing," reminded Mrs. Saxon.

Once again interjecting the appropriateness of the Wendy dilemma, Mrs. Ricks stated that in that period of history, the type of car-ing and nurturing displayed was necessary, while in the present it may be viewed as excessive.

Recognizing what the Wendy dilemma is one step, but realizing that those traits of excessive caring lie within a woman is a major milestone. Mrs. Saxon, who freely admitted that she was a victim of the Wendy Dilemma, stated that it took her having a nervous breakdown before she realized she needed help. "I was the mother of eight chil-dren and for a long time I felt that I had to be everything to everybody." For some women, realizing that they may be the victims of the Wendy Symdrome may mean simply acknowledging that the way things have been operating are not working anymore.

For the woman who decides it's best to put up with being a Wendy, much has been lost, not just for her, but also for those whom she has selected to be everything to "On one hand she has denied her own human potential, while on the other hand

potential, while on the other hand she has robbed the people in her life the chance to grow and make their own mistakes and successes."

What can the woman do who decides she no longer wants to be a victim of this "learned behavior?" Perhaps her first step would be to

delegate responsibility.
