

She garnered 26 assists, 19 blocked shots, 37 steals and never fouled out. Impressive?

Wait. She made 389 points for a 15.5 per game average and made the All-CIAA teams in 1984 and 1985 and the NCAA South Atlantic Regional team in 1985.

This year, Cassie has played in four games and has sunk 35 of 54 field goals for 64.8 percent, 11 of 20 free throws for 55 percent. She has pulled down 44 rebounds for 11.0 per


