That, she has been doing. For the past eight years, she has been officiating men and women's recreational sports, girls' basketball on the junior high level, on the senior high school level and for the past four years, she has been officiating on the college level. She is affiliated with the National Association of Women Intercollegiate Sports, the National Association of Girls and Women Sports, The NCAA, the Carolina Conference, the MEAC, in addition to working for an independent booking agency.

In all of those levels, Ms. Byers has been officiating only women's sports. Next year, however, she hopes to change all of that. "I want to officiate men's sports," began Karen. Adding, "When we are trained at clinics we are trained to work men's games. There's, a lot more intensity involved. The whistle blows about every five seconds and I just like the challenge it presents."

Attending clinica is only a part of the many steps there are in becoming a sports official. "Aside from the clinics, to become an official you have to work so many scrimmages; you have to register with a local booking agency, and you have to be able to earn a rating. Ms. Byers has no qualms in saying that officiating is a "tough job." As a matter of fact, she sees her assessment of what she does as one of the main reasons why more women aren't involved.

"I think a lot of women see the pressure that is involved and they simply don't want to deal with it. But me, I like the challenge officiating presents. I know that anytime I blow the whistle I have to be able to explain my call. In this you really

have to know what you're doing."

To make her job that more difficult, Ms. Byers interjected the
problem she has with male officials and their non-acceptance of women officials. "There are some men who treat women officials as equals, but the large majority of them don't want to have anything to do with us (women officials). Sometimes they even leave you out there on the court alone to carry your own weight. To me, it is three times as difficult to be a sports official when you're a woman than it is when you're a

Where Ms. Byers does get a lot of support from is from other women who are also officials.

Whatever negative aspects Ms. Byers has found in her role as a sports official, she has learned to accept as part of the territory. She does not set her sights on those things that could be considered hindrances; rather, she sets positive goals. One of which is her desire to officiate in professional basketball.

Ms. Byers is a member of the Southern Board of Officials, and was an invited guest of the CIAA Hall of Fame for Officials last year and will be attending the affair this year as well.
