

Congratulations to the West Charlotte Lions and the North Mecklenburg Vikings.

What a year for the newly formed Tri-County Conference of West Charlotte, North Mecklenburg, Olympic, East Gaston, Crest, Harding, and West Mecklenburg.

Fresh from the creators of the new North Carolina realignment plan, the conference has produced both state basketball champions.

What a year for coach Charles McCullough of the West Charlotte Lions. Charlie is the only coach in the state to have won crowns in both the black and white associations. He won the state championship in the last year for the old All-Black North Carolina State Athletic Association in 1966 when the West Charlotte Lions ambushed Hillside of Durham and now he adds another notch to his crown with a big win over Raleigh Broughton.

This West Charlotte team finished the season 29-0. They never had a real superstar, but they had a lot of stars-Maurice Caldwell, Duane Montgomery, Kevin Reid, Jules Springs, A. J. Morgan, and Chris Welch.

The victory on Saturday night gave Mecklenburg County a rare sweep of the boys' and girls' basketball championships in the state's largest classifications.

North Mecklenburg wrapped up the girls' title with a 61-54 win over Fayetteville Pine Forest.

The West Charlotte win was the first for the city since South Mecklenburg won in 1976.

Leading the charge against Raleigh Broughton was Kevin Reid with 13 points and 11 rebounds; Lance Jones with 12 points and 10 rebounds; Maurice Caldwell with 16 points; A.J. Morgan with 10 points; and Brian Hairston with nine points.

Jules Springs had five and Christ Welch had two for the

The Lions have played hard all year and they are more than deserving of the title.

The hero in overtime was Maurice Caldwell who sank a layup to give the Lions a 67-65 lead that proved to be the ultimate margin. Broughton's last point was on a free throw with six seconds left after a Caldwell foul.

West Charlotte's wins were 84-53 over Belmont South Point, 88-43 over Clover, 56-45 over York, 61-48 over Independence, 64-52 over East Mecklenburg, 97-50 over South Mecklenburg, 77-65 over Crest, 72-60 over Harding, 97-67 over South Mecklenburg, 71-55 over Olympic, 82-58 over West Mecklenburg, 68-64 over North Mecklenburg, 83-70 over East Gaston, 64-58 over Myers Park, 68-52 over Crest, 62-58 over Harding, 60-40 over Olympic, 59-46 over West Mecklenburg, 59p55 over East Gaston, 73-58 over North Mecklenburg, 70-59 over Myers Park, 82-65 over Harding, 70-68 over North Mecklenburg, 72-58 over Gastonia Ashbrook, 64-56 over Garinger, 47-45 over Gastonia Hunter Huss, 70-46 over Winston-Salem Parkland, 83-73 over Morganton Freedom, and 67-66 over Raleigh Broughton.

Andrea Stinson had an exciting year as one of the best

players in the county. She won the game's "Most Valuable Player" with 35 points, six rebounds, and nine steals.

This was the first Mecklenburg County girls' basket ball champion.

The Vikings finished the season 26-0 and undefeated. Stinson hit three straight long jumpers that started a 12-2 spurt that gave North Mecklenburg a 28-21 halftime lead.

Also contributing for the Vikings were Neese Gray with 15. She made six of seven field goals and handed out some tremendous assists.

Screen-O-Rama Scheduled

4-Ball Golf Tourney


