

# North Carolina Mutual President Receives Honorary Doctor Of Law Degree

Durham - William J. Kennedy III, chairman of the board, president, and chief executive officer of North Carolina Mutual Life Insurance Company, received the honorary degree, Doctor of Laws, at North Carolina Central University's Awards Day exercises at 10 a.m., Friday, April 4.

Mr. Kennedy was cited for his continuing efforts to improve the economic and social well-being of his city, state, and nation, and for his leadership in strengthening the economic power of black Americans.

Mr. Kennedy is a native of Durham, where he attended Pearson Elementary School and Hillside High School. He graduated from Palmer Memorial Institute in Sedalia in 1938.

He holds the bachelor of science degree in business administration from Virginia State College; the Master of Business Administration degree from the University of Pennsylvania, where he majored in insurance; and the Master of Business Administration degree from New York University, with a major in finance and investments. He has done further graduate study at NYU.

Mr. Kennedy is a charter member of the North Carolina Society of Financial Analysts, and a senior member of the Conference Board of New York City.

His board memberships have included the chairmanship of UNC Ventures, Inc., of Boston, and the boards of directors of Mechanics and Farmers Bank, Pfizer, Inc., Jones Group, Inc., Mobil Corporation, the Quaker Oats Company, and Air Atlanta.

He has also served as a member of the Board of Overseers of the University of Pennsylvania's Wharton School, of the Board of Visitors of Duke University's Fuqua School of Business, of the Board of Overseers of New York University Graduate School of Business Administration, of the Board of Trustees of Triangle Universities Center for Advanced Studies, of the Board of Trustees of the Business Foundation of the

University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, and of the Board of Visitors of Johnson C. Smith University. He became in 1983 a member of the Board of Visitors of North Carolina Central University.

For more than a decade, Mr. Kennedy has been identified by Ebony magazine as one of the 100 Most Influential Black Americans. He has also received awards and recognition from Tribune Charities, Black Enterprise magazine, the Opportunities Industrialization Centers of America, the National Business League, the Twenty First Century Foundation, Virginia State College, the National Minority Business Hall of Fame, and the New York University Graduate School of Business Administration Alumni Association.

His charitable and civic activities have included work with the United Student Aid Funds, the

National 4-H Council Advisory Committee, the Southeast Regional Advisory Council of the Boy Scouts of America, the Board of Directors of the Research Triangle Foundation of North Carolina, the National Advisory Council of Opportunities Industrialization Centers of America, the Board of Directors of the North Carolina Citizens Association, the Durham Business and Professional Chain, the Durham Committee on the Affairs of Black People, the Kiwanis Club of Tobaccoland, Inc., the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, the Durham Chamber of Commerce, the Governor's Council on the Arts and Humanities, and the North Carolina Council of Management and Development.

He is a member of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity and of Durham's White Rock Baptist Church.

# Barber-Scotia College Receives \$35,800 Kellogg Foundation Grant

Barber-Scotia College has joined with several other colleges and universities who are members of the United Negro College Fund, Inc. (UNCF) in a major project designed to improve member institutions' governance and management.

President McLean recently announced that Barber-Scotia has received a \$35,800 continuation grant from the W.K. Kellogg Foundation of Battle Creek, Michigan, making it possible for the institution to participate in the comprehensive activity known as the Integrated Systems Approach to Improving Management (ISATIM). The project is being administered by the United Negro College Fund, Inc.

Activities at Barber-Scotia College will be conducted through June 30, 1986. Grant monies will provide technical assistance toward completion of the development of an up-to-date management program in the Integrated Systems Approach to Improving Management.

Barber-Scotia is an historically black college affiliated with the

Presbyterian Church, USA, and a member of the United Negro College Fund, Inc. Barber-Scotia, founded in 1867, is a four-year liberal arts college offering baccalaureate degrees in 13 majors including Accounting, Computer Science, Math, Biology, Marketing, Teacher

Education and Hospitality Management, to name a few. The College is located in Concord, NC, just 20 miles north of Charlotte, NC.

Specific areas upon which improvement efforts are concentrated at colleges participating in the UNCF-sponsored project are determined by an assessment team made up of experts in the various areas of institutional management and representatives of the American Council on Education, the Association of Governing Boards of Colleges and Universities, and the National Association of Colleges and University Business Officers. These three Associations are working in cooperation with the UNCF in implementing the project.

Through the Kellogg grant, the resources of industry have an immeasurable impact on the quality of the operations of a college. Education and industry—what a combination for progress in a community and in this Nation!

The W.K. Kellogg Foundation, established in 1930 to "help people help themselves," has distributed more than \$843 million in support of programs in agriculture, education, and health. Areas of emphasis within those broad fields include adult continuing education; betterment of health; community-wide, coordinated, cost-effective health services; a wholesome food supply; and broadening leadership capacity of individuals. In Michigan only, projects are supported for economic development and opportunities for youth. The Foundation is today among the largest private philanthropic organizations in the world. It supports programs in the United States, Latin America, and the Caribbean, as well as international fellowship programs in other countries.
